## PERHAPS A FIFTH TEST: IS IT FUN?

We all know and love The Four-Way Test. In many ways, it's an improvement on the age-old golden rule that you should treat others the way you wish to be treated.

It's a guide for living, a tool for decision making, a moral code.



While Rotary has been served well by these four questions, they may not be enough in an era in which Rotary is trying to appeal to more people and have a broader impact.

There is another crucial question that we as Rotary members must always ask ourselves, and it is this: Is it *fun*?

This is the question I ask myself with everything I do. If it isn't fun, I don't do it. Some people may scoff at that mentality, but in my mind, life is too short to waste on things I don't enjoy. There are a hundred other organisations I could be a part of. If Rotary isn't fun, why should I join? And if I am already a member, but I'm not having fun, why should I stay?

Of course, I speak for myself, and perhaps I can also presume to speak for other young people. But I imagine that how I feel is also how many Rotary members feel all over the world. We all want to have fun while serving the sick, the impoverished, the embattled, and the hungry. And in my experience, Rotary can be the *most* fun part of my life.

But often, clubs become so entrenched in their habits that they forget to have fun. If Rotary isn't fun, how can we light a fire in the hearts of our members? How can we increase our membership? How can we survive? We must constantly ask ourselves: Is what we are doing *fun*?

This may not be a question fit for enshrining in the codes of Rotary, and perhaps it doesn't even warrant recitation at weekly meetings. However, it's probably the most important question we can ask ourselves when making decisions in our clubs. What we do in Rotary is not primarily for our own benefit, but people must enjoy Rotary if it is to survive.

This is the real golden rule of Rotary clubs: If what we do isn't fun, then it's not worth doing.

## Online program making an impact

ROTARY-BACKED Violence Free Families (VFF) has created a world-leading online program to help violent men change their behaviour.

The 14-week voice, text and video program is delivered to groups of a dozen men. The online system helps men who can't attend counselling in person, such as shift and country workers. It also suits men who don't want to feel exposed and judged in face-to-face encounters.

Seven of the nine VFF board members are past or present Rotarians, including District 9800 past assistant governor Gabe Hau.

The VFF program is one outcome of 21 years' work and over \$1m fundraising by the Rotary Club of Brighton, Vic, and VFF. The Brighton support started in 1995 after a young bayside child's violent death.

As a district endorsed program, the work of VFF is now supported by all 70 clubs of District 9800, as well as Women in Rotary.

## WHAT IS OUR VISION?

"If you come to a fork in the road, take it."

"If you don't know where you are going, you might wind up someplace else."

Well, that's one (or two...?) ways to think about the future. But maybe not what we want for our business, our personal goals, or indeed – our Rotary Club!



Some of the definitions of a vision include:

- · The description of how we want to be...
- · A shared view to guide our action
- A foundation upon which to build our long and short term plans.

It's hard to imagine a well-managed professional organisation not having a really clear idea where they are headed and what they would ideally like to achieve.

Having a vision is part of the strategic planning process and planning for the future is important to the success any organisation and Rotary clubs are no exception. A visioning session gives a dream to what's to come and the beginnings of a composed arrangement that advertises consensus, consistency, and coherence. It serves as the foundation for growing the club and becoming more effective.

Developing a plan involves three key steps:

- 1. Where are we now?
- Create a list of your club's strengths and weaknesses as of today
- Create a list of opportunities and challenges facing your Club and community.

#### 2. Where do we want to be?

- Create a list of 5 to 10 characteristics that you would like to see in your Club three to five years from now.
- Draft a one-sentence vision statement describing your Club and what you want it to be in three to five years. Allow for both individual and group work on this step.
- Finalise the vision statement with the full group, and make sure that all Club members support it.

#### 3. How do we get there?

- Develop strategic priorities that will help your club achieve the vision, considering:
  - Strengths and weaknesses of the club
  - Programs and missions of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation
  - External environment
  - Involvement of all members
  - Achievability in three to five years
- As a group, decide on the most important strategic priorities

   those that will have the greatest impact as your club works toward the vision.
- Identify annual goals that support each of the top strategic priorities.
- Determine the timeline, resources, and people necessary to meet the annual goals under each of the strategic priorities.







Australians have invented quite a few things over the years. Below is an interesting selection of some brilliant Australian inventions;

- CSIRO invented Aerogard to keep flies off cattle and prevent diseases. As well as being a summer essential, the product was used by the Queen when she visited Australia in 1963.
- ASPRO An aspirin based painkiller that was invented by Melbourne pharmacist George Nicholas in 1917.
- Melbourne University professor made history in 1978 by inventing the world's first bionic ear.
- Dr. David Warren from Melbourne invented the first black box flight recorder in 1958.
- ESKY Portable insulated box to carry beer around while keeping it cold, invented in the 1950s, originally of metal and later of plastic, can also be used to sit on. Standard equipment in any Australian household. In USA known as cooler or in New Zealund known as chully bun.
- A Sydney doctor invented the original heart pacemaker in 1926.
- George Kossoff and David Robinson built the world's first ultrasound scanner in 1961 at the Commonwealth Department of Health.
- A group of five CSIRO scientists invented LAN technology, otherwise known as WiFi, which is used in more than five billion devices globally and has earned more than \$430 million in royalties alone.

## **GOOD GOVERNANCE**

Corporate governance is the system by which your club or association is controlled.

It is about how your club or association manages its resources effectively for both members and stakeholders.



Committees and boards must fully understand their responsibilities, as well as the key operational aspects of their club/association.

Good corporate governance is about:

- <u>Planning</u> Developing strategic goals and objectives, and determining how these can be achieved
- Organisational performance Monitoring the performance of the club or association against performance targets to ensure the goals and objectives are achieved
- <u>Leadership</u> Ensuring the club or association is governed responsibly with the best interests of members and stakeholders at the core of decision making.

#### Benefits of good governance

- Better management Good governance encourages better managed and more efficiently organised clubs or associations.
- Improved communication A well-run club or association facilitates better informed members and volunteers.
- Sustainability and growth Careful business planning and implementation of policies and procedures helps sustain and develop your club or association and the sport.
- Increased membership People are more likely to join a club or association that is being well managed.

John o'Groats isn't even the furthest point from Land's End. There's an uninhabited spot called Duncansby Head, which is a few miles further away – though not as far north as Dunnet Head and not as far east as John o'Groats. At the other end of the country, Gwennap Head is further down from Duncansby Head than Land's End.

# 4. How hot does water have to be to wash the bacteria off your hands?

Cold water is just as effective as hot.

The most important ingredient when washing your hands is soap. The temperature of the water makes almost no difference. While bacteria can be killed by hot water, it would need to be boiling hot

#### 5. What species of tree is the tallest ever?







## BANKS CHARGE GOVERNMENT 'PROCESSING FEE' FOR **ANSWERING INQUIRY QUESTIONS**

A \$22.50 processing fee has been applied to each question answered during the parliamentary inquiry into banks, it was revealed today. The Government – which only discovered the fee today – has racked up a debt of \$695,000 in the three days of the inquiry so far.

A spokesperson for the banking sector said the fee was in line with current banking practices and represented a fair price for customers. "We're working hard to keep fees for our customers to a minimum. That's why we've reduced our question-answering fee from \$50 to just \$22.50 this year. It's our way of saying 'thanks' for banking with us," the spokesperson said.

He added that a 37.85% interest rate would be applied to the \$695,000 outstanding amount, calculated hourly.

The Government responded quickly and forcefully to the news, saying they would need to reduce the number of questions immediately. - Shovel

# ROTARY'S BATTLE FOR SURVIVAL WITH AGEING AND DECLINING MEMBERSHIP

ROTARY is used to fixing the world's problems, but now all eyes are on the organisation itself as it attempts to reverse an ageing and declining global membership. One of the largest and best known international humanitarian organisations, it has lost 1.2 million members in eight years and the average Australian Rotarian is now aged 71.

No one understands the problem better than charismatic Californian Brad Howard, Rotary International Director for Zones 25 & 26 in the United States and Canada.

"We have a hard time finding people to join us and an even harder time keeping them," he told a gathering of Rotarians in Cairns last week.

"I know you folks are battling it just like we in North America are battling it.

Over the past 10 years you've lost 16 per cent of your members and you're trying to find an answer as to how will we change this, how do we make ourselves more relevant?

Mr Howard said Rotary was no longer attracting the young business people and professionals who started it.

He said Rotary had become so focused on its ethos of "service above self" it had forgotten to serve the very people it was established to help.

"We need to start talking about Rotary differently. You hear people say Rotary is the greatest service organisation in the world. I disagree. We are a membership organisation that does service.

"We have failed to recognise our customers – the men and women who join our clubs.

"The next question you must ask is who is our competition? It's a long list," he said.

"Our competition is life – it's work, it's family, it's church, it's friends and it's sleep. The really bad thing about that is they're perhaps the most formidable opponent we have and until we start being competitive with life, that line's always going to be on the inside trying to get out."

Mr Howard said after 14 years of declining membership in the US, Rotary had enjoyed growth last year and it came from younger people.

"Fifty-two per cent of the world's population are 30 and younger. The wave of change is coming and Rotary has the opportunity to take this on."






## **BUILDING A TEAM**

Some tips that describe the environment that must occur within the team for successful teamwork to take place. Successful teamwork is the cornerstone for creating functioning, contributing teams.

- 1. The team understands the goals and is committed to attaining them. This clear direction and agreement on mission and purpose is essential for effective teamwork. Team members must have an overall mission that is agreed upon and that provides the umbrella for all that the team tries to do. This team clarity is reinforced when the organisation has clear expectations for the team's work, goals, accountability, and outcomes.
- The team creates an environment in which people are comfortable taking reasonable risks in communicating, advocating positions, and taking action. Team members trust each other. Team members are not punished for disagreeing.
- 3. Communication is open, honest, and respectful. People feel free to express their thoughts, opinions, and potential solutions to problems. People feel as if they are heard out and listened to by team members who are attempting to understand. Team members ask questions for clarity and spend their thought time <u>listening</u> deeply rather than forming rebuttals while their coworker is speaking.
- 4. Team members have a strong sense of belonging to the group. They experience a deep commitment to the group's decisions and actions. This sense of belonging is enhanced and reinforced when the team spends the time to develop team norms or relationship guidelines together.
- 5. Team members are viewed as unique people with irreplaceable experiences, points of view, knowledge, and opinions to contribute. After all, the purpose of forming a team is to take advantage of the differences. Otherwise, why would any organization approach projects, products, or goals with a team? In fact, the more that a team can bring out divergent points of view, that are thoughtfully presented and supported with facts as well as opinions, the better.
- 6. Creativity, innovation, and different viewpoints are expected and encouraged. Comments such as, "we already tried that and it didn't work" and "what a dumb idea" are not allowed or supported.
- 7. The team has agreed upon procedures for diagnosing, analysing, and resolving teamwork problems and conflicts. The team does not support member personality conflicts and clashes nor do team members pick sides in a disagreement. Rather, members work towards the mutual resolution of problems and disagreements.
- 8. Participative leadership is practiced in <u>leading meetings</u>, assigning tasks, <u>recording decisions and commitments</u>, assessing progress, holding team members accountable, and providing direction for the team.

 Members of the team make high quality decisions together and have the support and commitment of the group to carry out the decisions made.

If a team can get these ten factors right, success and a rewarding sense of teamwork will follow. It's not always the task at hand that challenges teams in their progress, it's the relationships and the little things that happen day-to-day. If team members can rise above the trench, they can achieve greatness.
