Meeting Notes



CLUB MEETING

Tuesday 27th October at Mindarie Senior College

The meeting was opened by stand-in Sergeant at Arms, Brian Baily, at 1806.

President Nigel advised that our exchange student Maud, was performing at a concert in one of the College halls and that some members wished to attend. In addition, since there was no guest speaker, the meeting would be shortened.

He advised that apologies had been received from Brian Butterworth, Sandy Jones, Sally Farr, Tiffany Dowling,, Bill Benbow, Tracy Roberts, Nick Gerrard, Sharon Kinraid, Helen Hegarty and Lindsay Robeson.

He expressed his disappointment about the lack of attendance from members and that a number had not communicated their apologies.

He welcomed Geoff Russell to the meeting and requested him to give the toast to Rotary and to Australia. There were no makeups.

Nigel informed those present that the Swap Mart would need to go into recess during December as the Shopping Centre would not allow the Swap Mart to operate. Thus we had 4 more Swap Marts before the "closure" and we would resume on the 3rd January. We would need to hold off on our advertising plans until January.

He also thanked members for their efforts during the month i.e. the Catalina Telethon, Hat Day, two Bunnings Sizzles and the Swap Marts. He mentioned that the Relay for Life did not have the support as we would have hoped for.

International Service

Margaret was not present but there was discussion about the donations in kind at Mindarie PS. There were two issues of note:

- The need to present the School Principal with a plan as to what would be done with the donations collected by the School to date i.e. where would they be stored?
- The desire by the School to have some of the donations transported to the Ampan PS in PNG by the end of the year.

Points discussed included:

- Options regarding storage of the donations.
- District had advised that there were not facilities available and that storage of containers and goods was a District issue and involved many Clubs.
- Consideration of the quality of the donations v the cost of transport
- Linking with another PNG Rotary Club was considered essential

- The issues associated with getting goods transported to PNG customs cleared without entanglement with unnecessary and illicit costs
- Apparently Margaret is considering travelling to PNG in December and what could she take with her? Any costs associated with large parcels etc would be borne by the Club
- Potential temporary storage options proposed by Mike It was agreed that the final strategy etc, needed to be determined by the International and Community Service Committee

Mike mentioned that Mindarie PS is extremely happy with the association with RCM and that the PNG project fits very well with their curriculum.

Youth Service

Mike provided the following information:

- There is a meeting with the Wanneroo Youth Services on the 18th November to discuss broader youth engagement issues/projects
- We have no takers for the 4 Way Test programme. Geoff mentioned that heats are currently underway.
- Mike mentioned that under the above circumstances he was not prepared to have RCM participate in the 4 Way test.
- There was no feedback yet from District as regards RYPEN handover
- He attended a meeting with the Police Commissioner in relation to the Interplast/Mongolia Project Blue initiative.
 The intent is to take a group of students to Mongolia and show them how Interplast assists the locals. (Details are in this Bulletin)

Geoff then gave a presentation of the Convicts for a Cause event to be held at Fremantle Prison on the 7th November. He stated that funds raised would go to the Diabetes WA research projects and that there were two tiers of fundraising. Those attending could be guests or convicts. The former could pay an attendance fee and receive excellent value for money from the food and drinks whilst the Convicts would raise money to get themselves out of iail.

He mentioned that it had been successful in the past and that it was a good night for the whole family.

Meeting Notes



Treasurer's Report

President Nigel distributed a P&L for the period 1^{st} July -12^{th} October, that had been prepared by Peter and Peter provided an explanation of how it is to be interpreted.

There was general discussion about the state of the Club's finances:

- Back in July, Service Committees had been asked to prepare budgets and were expected to undertake their own fundraising activities and not simply rely on allocations from Community Service which is the Club's primary source of income.
- Committee expenses have been amortised over a 12 month period and so far look good as there have essentially been no fundraising activities by those Committees to date.
- Admin income is down on budget as there is still a considerable amount outstanding as regards membership dues.
- The two Bunnings sizzles netted around \$1900, the Catalina Telethon netted \$650 and the three recent Swap Marts netted around \$800.

Swap Mart Committee

PP Darren informed the members about activities in relation to the Swap Mart:

- Directional signage has been ordered but there is still a question mark about the size of the wording and the logo.
- These directional signs are to be put up on the morning of the Swap Mart.
- Nothing has come of the approach to ECU as regards a marketing project but an alternative option has arisen.
- A meeting with Wanneroo Council as regards other signage is still to occur.

Raylene provided members with her initiatives and thoughts of the Swap Mart Facebook page:

- The number of "likes' has jumped in the last week or so
- The Facebook Ads that we pay \$32 per month for are not serving us well at all and we should cancel this.
- There are too many people with Admin rights to the Facebook page
- A busker has been arranged to attend
- We might consider selling our surplus drinks at the Swap Mart
- Coffee van is unlikely to attend unless we can "guarantee" them that they would sell around 200 cups.
- Perhaps consider doing a sausage sizzle at the event President Nigel expressed the Club's thanks to Raylene for taking ownership of the Swap Mart Facebook page.

There was additional discussion about the promotion of the Swap Mart in school newsletters in the forthcoming weeks.

The raffle was drawn by Geoff Russell and the lucky winner was Nigel. In addition, we thank Geoff for donating a fine bar stool for another RCM raffle in the future.

Once more, Brian Baily performed the Sergeant-at-Arms role in excellent wit and style.

Nigel advised that the next meeting would be on the 10th November.

Meeting closed at 7:20 pm.

Twitter Announces There No Trending Topics Today

'Maybe Something Will Catch On Tomorrow,' Social Network Says



SAN FRANCISCO—Noting the lack of any social causes, amusing hashtag games, or major news stories currently stimulating public conversations on their site, Twitter officials announced Monday that there are no trending topics today, but suggested that perhaps something might catch on tomorrow.


"Normally, our site displays a list of newsmakers and issues currently capturing the world's attention and engaging users in discussion, but it doesn't look like people are really talking about anything today," said Twitter interim CEO Jack Dorsey, adding that a few new hashtags started popping up in users' posts earlier in the day, but every single one failed to become popular.

"Some days, even if a famous person dies or there's a big protest somewhere, people just aren't interested. Maybe something might pop up and start trending later. We'll absolutely put it up on the site if that's the case, but until then we're not going to force it."

At press time, a company spokesperson confirmed that the hashtag #NothingTrendingOnTwitter was failing to gain much momentum.




ADVENTURE
