On the 27th July, RCM were invited to give a presentation to Mindarie Primary School year 4 students. The topic was life and schooling in Kaiapit Papua New Guinea. The village of Kaiapit is west of Lae and in the higlands.

RCM International Committee is seeking donations in kind to assist the villagers with school equipment/items as well as medical equipment.

Margaret, with support from Tina, husband Billy and Ralph, enthralled the students by telling them what life is completely different from Mindarie. It was somewhat evident that the young faces showed surprise and disbelief that:

- Children wake up at 4am
- Make their own breakfast of bananas and fruit because their parents are out tending to the gardens and vegetable patches
- Travel the equivalent distance from Yanchep to Mindarie (and back) each day but it is over mountains and through rivers, just to get to school.
- There is no furniture and the children sit on dirt floors, use the old fashioned chalk tablets and lack paper and books.
- Lunch at school is also bananas and fruit.
- When they come home from school, they help their parents in the gardens until dinner time.
- Dinner is again a variety of bananas and fruit.
- Parents are poor, as regards worldly goods, and thus kids do not have a lot of clothes, do not have iPads and computers, electricity and cars.

Mindarie PS is looking to "adopt" the Kaiapit school . They were surprised to hear Margaret advise them that when she spoke to one of the village elders (another story about how complicated this is) about speaking at Mindarie PS, the elder was in tears and would be pleased to name a newly built



classroom after Mindarie PS and Mindarie Rotary Club.

Our thanks to Andrea White (Assoc. Principal) and Barbara Bromley (Principal) for giving us the opportunity. The School has already donated old desks and chairs for this project.

Key points from her presentation:

- With over 7 million Australian professionals and 364 million users around the world, LinkedIn is the largest professional social network and it is the number one validation tool for business and recruiters. If you are cannot be found, have an incomplete or dormant profile, you are missing out on opportunities!
- On social; media there is a need to be liked and trusted
- It is essential to build a network but you need to be choosing the right people as your network connections
- It is important to look at your content strategy i.e what are you showing about yourself and who are you targeting
- The most important aspect is that you need to have a phot and a "headline" which makes it clear what you are about
- Once you have a profile set up it is important to engage with your network
- Engagement is achieved via conversations on topics that may be of interest to others. This will attract the "right" people to connect with you.
- Check privacy settings. Many Facebook users do not pay attention to privacy settings and thus expose themselves to recruiters who certainly look at Facebook pages.

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

We're delighted to report that [today] Nigeria has passed one year with no new cases of the wild poliovirus.

This is the longest the country has ever gone without a case of polio and a critical step on the path toward a polio-free Africa. We've come a long way since the bleak years when the virus reached its peak. It was only a decade ago that polio struck 12,631 people in Africathree quarters of all cases in the world.

We congratulate Rotarians who have donated \$688.5 million to fight polio throughout Africa, including more than \$200 million to Nigeria. We congratulate Rotarians from Africa and around the world who have also devoted countless hours to immunize the children who now have the opportunity for healthier, happier lives.

With the ambitious scope of Rotary's PolioPlus program, our efforts are having a far-reaching, transformative impact beyond the eradication of polio.

With the infrastructure put in place by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), Nigeria not only reduced its polio caseload by 90% in 2014, but it also successfully thwarted the world's most lethal Ebola outbreak to date, in only 90 days, a response faster than even the U.S., and rightly praised by the World Health Organization as 'world-class'.

In Nigeria and elsewhere, the Initiative provides a blueprint to reach all children with a package of lifesaving vaccines and health interventions. This is a vital step on the path to human development, as we know that with improved public health, more resources can be channeled towards education and economic growth.

If the stringent World Health Organization testing criteria are met, then Nigeria could be removed from the list of polio-endemic countries in September of this year.

However, our work is not done. We know that polio can easily return, with devastating consequences, if we don't stamp it out now.

Foundation Facts

In this column, we have spent much of the past two years discussing how you can support The Rotary Foundation from a fundraising point of view. While we do in fact raise a lot of money, you are also very good at

spending your money to Do Good in the World. It is the participation in a Global Grant that really enables your club to better understand the value of your support. Some clubs may never apply for a Global Grant, because they have failed to understand the value equation.

Global Grants have a minimum award of \$U\$15,000 (club contributions matched 50 per cent and district DDF contributions matched 100 per cent). Your club can be the sponsor of this grant project, with very little cash contribution. I was recently at a club meeting where funding an \$85,000 project was being discussed. The members' enthusiasm for the project increased significantly once they realised the impact the project would have, and the joint contributions from other clubs and districts, as well as from The Rotary Foundation. The grand idea for this project was thought to be beyond the fundraising capability of the club.

Some clubs have great ideas and believe they are cash poor, but by understanding the mechanics of funding a grant project, even the smallest clubs can make them happen.

There is a wealth of senior district leaders to help you write the grant application. All districts have a District Rotary Foundation Chair and this is your first port of call.

The keys to your grant are the sustainability, the training, the overall community impact and compliance with an area of focus.

Ask your District Rotary Foundation Chair to provide you with some examples of approved grants from the area of focus that you wish to have a grant project in.
