President Sandy advised:


- The Ampan container was collected on 3rd November and is currently at Fremantle being "recertified".

The Official Rotary Flag





An official flag was formally adopted by Rotary International at the 1929 Convention in Dallas, Texas.

The Rotary flag consists of a white field with the official wheel emblem emblazoned in gold in the centre of the field.

The four depressed spaces on the rim of the Rotary wheel are coloured royal blue.

The words "Rotary" and "International" printed at the top and bottom depressions on the wheel rim are also gold.

The shaft in the hub and the keyway of the wheel are white.

The first official Rotary flag reportedly was flown in Kansas City, Missouri, in January 1915. In 1922 a small Rotary flag was carried over the South Pole by Admiral Richard Byrd, a member of the Rotary Club of Winchester, Virginia, U.S.A.

Four years later, the admiral carried a Rotary flag in his expedition to the North Pole.

Some Rotary clubs use the official Rotary flag as a banner at club meetings.

In these instances it is appropriate to print the words "Rotary Club" above the wheel symbol and the name of the city, state or nation below the emblem.

The Rotary flag is always prominently displayed at the World Headquarters as well as at all conventions and official events of Rotary International.

Did you know that the white-tail deer can jump higher than the average house?

Did you know that Rotary founder Paul Harris wasn't the first president of a Rotary club? That distinction is actually held by Harris's friend Silvester Schiele, who served as the first president of the Rotary Club of Chicago. Harris deferred his club leadership duties until February 1907, when he was elected the third president of the Chicago club.

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF THE BOARD IN A ROTARY CLUB OR NOT FOR PROFIT ORGANISATION?

The Board is responsible for providing leadership and strategy to an organisation such as a Rotary Club.

Both Rotary International and WA Law clearly defines that the governing body of a Club will be a Board with a minimum number of Board members.

Generally, Boards delegate some of their responsibilities to staff or volunteers. However, there are some things that are usually reserved for the Board such as developing (or at least approving) a strategic plan, considering how organisational risks should be managed and calling meetings of the organisation's (general) members.

Every not for profit is different and so are their Boards. However, there are some responsibilities that are common to most Boards:

- **strategy** setting the organisation's long-term goals and making sure it pursues its charitable purposes
- □ accountability making sure your organisation meets its obligations, manages its finances and operates transparently
- ☐ resourcing securing funding and other resources to support the work of the organisation
- **advocacy** representing the charity to the community and to its members and stakeholders
- monitoring making sure the charity is run as required under its governing documents (by laws and constitution) and WA legislation.

As a registered not for profit organisation, the Rotary Club of Mindarie is required to conduct its business under the rules of the Associations Incorporation Act (1987) and the Charitable Collections Act (1946).

In addition, the President, Treasurer and Secretary of the Club are the authorised Principal Executive Officers of the Club registered with the WA Department of Commerce to hold the Charitable license.

There is a process where Club members, voting a an AGM or specially convened meeting, can amend the by laws and constitution to a degree (as long as it conforms with WA legislation and RI guidelines).

While the design system better aligns Rotary communications, it also provides enough flexibility that each club can have its own creative voice within the framework."



Interested parties are invited to submit applications for the 2017 District 9465 Handicamp to be held at Point Walter Campsite In January/February 2017.

Applications can be downloaded from the District website, or contact the Chair.

What is Handicamp?

Handicamp is a week long live in camp for 18 to 35 year old people with disability, who are teamed with a "buddy" for a week of fun and adventure. The camp is based on double participation and reward, supervised by a volunteer Rotary committee and nursing support.

When is Handicamp?

Handicamp 2017 will be held from Sunday 29th January to Saturday 4th February 2017. Buddies arrive at 10am on Sunday morning and the campers arrive at 2pm on Sunday afternoon. The camp finishes at 11am on Saturday morning, with campers being picked up at 10am

What Happens on Handicamp?

Activities include Archery, Abseiling and Flying Fox, Ten Pin Bowling, Trip to Adventure World and Zoo, Watersports (biscuiting and boat rides), Bingo, Karaoke ...plus lots of swimming, pool games, crafts and laughter!

Campers and Buddies - Who are they?

Campers are people with disability, between the ages of 18 and 35, who have not attended a Handicamp previously. Handicamp is about participation so we accept applicants who can and will participate and integrate in all activities. We accept physical, neurological and mental disability, and previous disabilities have included Cerebral Palsy, Autism, Downs Syndrome, Vision Impairment, Spina Biffda, mobility impairment and head Injuries.

Buddies are volunteers between 18 and 35. Criteria for being a buddy are the ability to attend and stay on the camp for the entire week, a caring nature and be willing to participate in all camp activities. Buddies are drawn from Rotary contacts, Rotaract Clubs, past Rotary program attendees (think RYLA, Youth Exchange, RYPEN), students or other sources of committed young volunteers.


What does it cost?



Mexico Builds Wall First



Mexico has erected a full-length border wall to keep out the millions of Americans hoping to flee from a Trump Presidency.

The wall, which stretches the entire length of the Mexico-US border, was built by a team of Mexican labourers who until recently had formed the backbone of the American agricultural industry. They've since pre-empted a Trump victory and returned home, causing the US agricultural industry to collapse.

A Mexican spokesperson said the country could not accommodate such an influx of illegal immigration, particularly from a country full of people crazy enough to vote for a reality TV host.

Yesterday thousands of Americans were trapped on the Californian and Texan borders, desperately looking for gaps in the wall. One man said he planned to hire a Mexican immigrant to build him a large ladder to enable him to scale the wall. He then remembered there were no Mexican immigrants available. He will start work on the ladder himself next month.
