**MEETING NOTES** 

## CLUB MEETING Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> July at Mindarie Senior College

The meeting opened at 1805 with poor attendance, perhaps due to school holidays.

Apologies were received from Brian Butterworth, Rani Dogra, Mike Gilbert, Alan Ward, Sandy Jones, Sarah Morgan, Jack Morgan, Tracey Roberts, Karina Martin.

Nigel acknowledged the guests attending: Phil Cousins (PP Wanneroo and guest speaker), Tina Burain, Sharon Kinraid and Raelene Quinn. Mention was made that another potential new member, Shirly Coster could not attend on Tuesdays due to personal commitments.

Club members were advised of the "new rule" to be adopted for Club meetings (as stated in the notice of meeting:

"It will be assumed that all members will be attending the meeting and thus catering will be arranged accordingly. If a member does not advise that they will not be attending, they will still be charged for the meal." Peter advised that last year, the Club made a loss on the Club meeting meals.

The toast to Rotary was given by Sharon Kinraid Nigel mentioned that we have three applications for membership (Sharon, Raelene and Tina) There were no makeups from any members.

Nigel then presented his view of how he wished the Club to move forward over the course of his leadership. He made particular mention of the Members' Survey that had been circulated back in May 2015 and that he had taken cognisance of the views of the Club Members that had responded to this survey.

There were three areas of focus for the year ahead:

- Improved fellowship and communication
- Taking SwapMart to a higher level
- Attract and retain members





Key points of Nigel's first address as President included:

- He saw the Bulletin as an important communication tool and stated that things had not gone well with the regularity of publication of the Bulletin. He acknowledged Ralph's effort with the Changeover Bulletin and stated that Ralph was basically in a caretaker role that we really needed someone to take this on full time.
- The Members' Survey had indicated that members wanted more information about what was going on and that this would be addressed. He recommended that Club Members should make an effort to go to the website as it was being kept up to date with current events.
- SwapMart needs to grow and he will be looking to the Community Service Committee to come up with ways of improving on what is currently being done.
- SwapMart rosters are published on the website and Margaret is revising the current roster in the light of fewer members.
- Directors of the Areas of Service are now in the process of doing budgets, something that has not been done previously.
- RCM needs to lift its profile with more external communication of its activities. At the moment, Lisa has done a great job organising the publicity for the handover of the HAND trailer, and Sandy had done great work in respect of other activities. However, we need someone to take on the role of publicity?
- He thanked Lisa and Brian Butterworth for their efforts at the Changeover Dinner.
- Club Service is working on a new member process and that it was really every members responsibility to bring in new members and help retain existing members
- The Members' Survey results will be available on the website from tomorrow

Nigel then handed over to Ralph who advised that as Nigel had mentioned previously , the feedback from the Member Survey indicated that we needed to improve communication to members. Consequently, meeting formats would be as before, with reports from each of the Directors of Areas of Service, with the addition of a report from both the Secretary and the Treasurer.

The Secretary would summarise what is happening at Board meetings and the Treasurer would provide a financial status report. Such reports would be monthly (every second Club meeting)

He stated that there had been two Board meetings so far and the issues/matters under discussion included:

- State of the Club's finances.
- Area of Service Committee budgets each Committee needs to determine a budget, in consultation with the Committee members, and that this needs to include fundraising activities so that we are not just reliant on the SwapMart.
- We expect that Committees will be more active in planning and executing events and activities and thus members will have more involvement.
- We are looking to Club Service to plan and manage more social and fellowship events.
- Included in our thinking are fundraisers such as grand raffles and smaller raffles, perhaps 4-5 during the course of the year but these would have to have defined objectives.
- Tightening up and revamping new member induction processes.
- A more planned approach to giving donations i.e. raising funds for defined purposes. Committee members will be active in such planning.
- SwapMart facts/points of issue:
  - Held every second Sunday
  - Based upon records for Jan-Jun 2015, our average numbers per event are 25 sellers and net of \$458 after expenses
  - There are two Facebook pages
  - Of the current 21 members, 6-7 are unavailable for SwapMart rosters
  - The Board has decided to trial staffing SwapMart with three members rather than four
  - In order to boost funds raised, we need to increase exposure of the event
  - We are considering holding SwapMart weekly.
     This would mean that members are on roster every 4 weeks
  - As per Nigel's approach, it is left to the Community Service Committee to come up with solutions/suggestions to these two issues.

Peter advised that he could not deliver a financial status report as we still did not have access to the bank accounts. A report would be forthcoming next meeting.

Lisa advised that a social event was under consideration for 22<sup>nd</sup> August. This could be at a restaurant or a member's house. A vote was taken in favour of a member's house. Tiffany volunteered her place.

Discussion also took place regarding

- a picnic event at Yanchep on 1<sup>st</sup> November.
- A Christmas event around 8<sup>th</sup> December
- It was agreed that social events did not have to occur on Fridays or weekends but could be during the week, especially if a proposed Christmas events is being planned.
- Lisa to explore further.

Sally spoke about Relay for Life, for which she had already booked a site.

- Scheduled for 17<sup>th</sup>/18<sup>th</sup> October
- We need to raise around \$1500 for the RCM team
- We need volunteers
- See the website for details

Other matters covered included:

- Need to have discussion with Victoria at Ocean Keys Centre as the extended trading hours over Christmas impacted the SwapMart
- The trailer handover to HAND and how appreciative they were
- Alice returned to Japan on 6<sup>th</sup> July. Credit to Tiffany for her work with respect to Exchange Students as well as the host families.
- Sharon advised that she will be absent for the next few meetings

Sally then continued the tradition of levying fines left, right and centre and relished her role as Sergeant-at-Arms.

Phil Cousins (PP Wanneroo) Spoke about Youth Focus and Ride for Youth

Youth Focus aims to put a stop to youth suicide, depression and self-harm. It operates a team of tertiary trained and skilled mental health professionals to provide young people and their families with a range of free, unlimited and expert early intervention and prevention services. Youth Focus is a not-for-profit community based organisation working with people aged 12-25 years.

Some funding is received from both State and Federal governments but, as always, this is never enough. This is where The Hawaiian Ride fro Youth was born.

In 2003, a group of social riders from Floreat decided to challenge themselves and make a difference. So instead of riding around the Swan River each week, they decided to ride from Albany to Perth over 5 days and 700 kms.

From just 24 riders in 2003, they raised \$150,000 and in 2015, from 138 riders, \$2,4 million was raised,

Over a 13 year journey, some \$12.6 million has been raised for Youth Focus.

## FOUR AVENUES OF SERVICE

The term "Four Avenues of Service" is frequently used in Rotary literature and information. The "Avenues" refer to the four elements of the Object of Rotary: Club Service, Vocational Service, Community Service and International Service

Although the Avenues of Service are not found in any formal part of the constitutional documents of Rotary, the concept has been accepted as a means to describe the primary areas of Rotary activity.

- "Club Service" involves all of the activities necessary for Rotarians to perform to make their club function successfully.
- "Vocational Service" is a description of the opportunity each Rotarian has to represent the dignity and utility of one's vocation to the other members of the club.
- "Community Service" pertains to those activities which Rotarians undertake to improve the quality of life in their community. It frequently involves assistance to youth, the aged, handicapped and others who look to Rotary as a source of hope for a better life.
- The Fourth Avenue, "International Service," describes the many programs and activities which Rotarians undertake to advance international understanding, goodwill and peace. International Service projects are designed to meet humanitarian needs of people in many lands.

When a Rotarian understands and travels down the "Four Avenues of Service," the Object of Rotary takes on even greater meaning.
