- Second class meant you remained seated until there was a problem along the way, when you had to exit the stagecoach and walk alongside.
- But third class passengers not only exited when there was a problem, they were
 also the ones who had to fix a broken wheel or even push the stagecoach along,
 through the mud, up the hills, no matter what came along.

So I began thinking about this when it comes to our involvement in Rotary. Let me ask you – what class ticket do you hold?

Pampered, or detached?

Too many of us hold first class tickets – we expect to be waited on and catered to – even pampered! We're willing to ride, but not push. We just sit back and let the others do the work.

But there are also those in our organization who hold second class tickets – detached spectators who show up but don't want to get too involved. Their name goes on the roster, they even include their membership on their resume... but that's about it.

What it means to be third class



MEDICAL EQUIPMENT RECYCLING COMMITTEE (MERC)

MERC is a sub-committee of the Rotary Club of West Perth (RCWP) that collects, sorts, packs and transports superseded medical equipment to developing countries.



Most of the equipment comes from Royal Perth Hospital but there are also other suppliers. Items of furniture such as hospital beds and heavy equipment have been sourced from within the hospital and health system. The machinery has up-to-date service histories and is known to be functioning correctly. Manual beds are ideal to send to places that have unreliable power supplies. Approximately 500 manual hospital beds have been sent overseas by the MERC program.

Smaller items of equipment such as needles, syringes, blood collection tubes and disposable forceps are collected as left-overs from clinical trials and similar projects. Permission has been sought in every case from the original owners of this equipment who are pleased that the items not go to land-fill. Guidelines from Rotary International and the World Health Organisation are strictly adhered to by MERC. Medicines are not included in the MERC project as the export/import of drugs is a complex area and beyond the scope of this project.

District 9455 Interplast Update



<u>District 9455 sponsored program</u> to Cagayan de Oro in the Philippines

Thank you to the contributions from 20 Rotary Clubs within the 9455 district in the last Rotary year, plus other 10 donations from individuals, we have successfully raised sufficient funds to fund a program.

We have now been advised by Interplast that the funds raised have been allocated to an Interplast program to Cagayan de Oro in the Philippines, which is planned for September 2016.

This program will include a team of 6-7 (surgeons, anaesthetists and nurses) and they are expected to provide 80-100 free and life-changing surgeries (primarily cleft lip and palate repairs) to the local community as well as training of local medico's.

The program is run in close collaboration with the Rotary Club of Cagayan de Oro, who are extremely active in assisting patients and their families to access the program, as well as being very supportive of the Interplast team. We will provide an update on completion of the program.

Ongoing contributions from District 9455 Rotary Clubs

Our district 9455 has set a target of raising sufficient funds with support of clubs within the district for one medical team to Asia/Pacific each Rotary year.

We would be pleased if your club can give consideration to ongoing contributions to Interplast on an annual basis. Hopefully your club can budget an annual amount for the great work that Interplast does.

What is our District doing in respect Interplast?

- Seeking to raise awareness of Interplast.
- Regular promotion of Interplast through regular updates and visibility at Rotary events
- Seeking corporate donations/sponsorship
- Work with District clubs on fund raising activities



Rockson, a young boy from a remote part of Solomon Islands, had his first operation which repaired a severe cleft lip and reconstructed his nose with a bone graft from his ribs. On a follow up trip Interplast Surgeons performed the next stage of surgery to repair Rockson's cleft palate.

What is the good work that Interplast does?

Interplast Australia & New Zealand provide surgical and health services in developing countries in the Asia Pacific region by providing free medical treatment and training. Each member of an Interplast program is fully qualified in their field of expertise and VOLUNTEER their time to participate in an Interplast program.

- · Interplast volunteers provide free treatment to people living with a disability from a congenital condition such as cleft lip and palate, or an acquired condition such as burn scar contractures. Treatment is targeted to the indigent population who would otherwise not be able to afford to access services.
- · Interplast assists with developing local capacity to provide surgery and ancillary services by providing training and mentoring programs for medical and allied health professionals.
- Each program undertakes approx. 80 surgeries and provides valuable training.

The impact that the treatment can make to each patient is profound and in most cases life changing







Aussies Totally Transform Olympic Village, In Biggest House Reveal Yet!





Working around the clock, and on a wafer-thin budget, Australia's Olympic team has converted an old, cramped Rio bedroom into a palatial Manhattan-style loft apartment.

Home Beautiful editor and House Rules judge Wendy Moore said they had done an amazing job. "I just love the use of colour and natural light.
